WHY SEND HISPANIC MISSIONARIES?

62 MILLION

The Hispanic or Latino population in the U.S., which includes people of any race, was 62.1 million in 2020. It grew 23%, while the population that was not of Hispanic or Latino origin grew 4.3% since 2010. By 2050, the Hispanic or Latino population is expected to reach 100 million.
