WHY SEND HISPANIC MISSIONARIES?

64 MILLION

The Hispanic or Latino population in the U.S., which includes people of any race, was 63.7 million in 2022. It increased 1.7% between 2021 and 2022, ahead of the national growth rate of .5% and second only to the 2.4% growth rate of the Asian American population. By 2050, the Hispanic or Latino population is expected to reach 100 million.
